The Impact of Energizing Education

Although school is out for the summer, Energizing Education is still hard at work, gearing up for another exciting school year.

During the summer months, we are usually busy recruiting new mentors, thinking up new and exciting themes for family nights, and making key improvements to maximize the volunteer and mentor experience during the school year. With that said, we have big goals for the upcoming year.

EE operates with the intention of making sure students receive the one-on-one support they need to be reading at grade level, but another part is making sure they don't struggle and have fun while accomplishing these goals. No child is like his or her peers and this is what makes Energizing Education a unique program. Although our in-school mentoring design focuses on reading, writing, and word work, because no child is the same, weekly lesson plans are developed with each child's needs in mind. So although they have the same

components, different activities are provided for students and their mentor to work with.

This year Energizing Education mentors worked with 177 students and their achievements were amazing to see from week to week. At the end of every year we ask parents and mentors to complete surveys. Mentors loved seeing their students each week and were always surprised by the stories they shared with them.

Overall, they said the experience was enjoyable and they are looking forward to returning in the fall. What parents shared about their children were all of the things and more that we hoped would happen. Several parents shared that they noticed major confidence boosts, an eagerness to learn and a love for reading, and that their child's reading improved significantly.

We hope the upcoming school year is just as rewarding for parents and their children and we are eager to see everyone back in the school for mentoring and family nights.

Make a smooth transition from summer back to school

Students will return to school in just a few weeks. Start early getting them back into the school routine. Make sure your children are set up for a successful school year starting from day one. Start transitioning them from their summer bedtime and wakeup time to what their school schedule will look like. Also, If you haven't been reading this summer, you still have time! Set aside time each day between now and when school begins to make sure they're prepared for the upcoming year and haven't forgotten key things. You can do this by looking up grade specific activities and printables online.
